Many thanks to Mark Poston who has done an excellent job of getting the paper moving in a very positive direction during his last two years as the President of the Board. His leadership and direction provided a good start to an exceptional monthly paper specifically for Masons and their families. He has successfully seen 14 consecutive editions delivered with more participation from you, our

members. The quality of the paper and the articles has steadily improved, and the distribution costs have lowered due to the hard work of our editor-in-chief, Adam Thayer, and our Business Manager, Amy Fisher. Having said all this, we still have a way to go to make the paper a complete success.

For those of you who get the Masonic News online, I have asked our editor to develop a password system for our subscribers to better secure our site. I am aware that this will take some time to fully develop, and may be confusing at first, but it will be better in the long run and individuals will be able to sign up online to receive the Masonic News. This will not affect those of you who already get it online through your Lodge or Chapter...you will soon receive information to allow you to access the news the same way you have been. I hope this will not inconvenience you for very long as we move forward with this initiative and feel we will, in the long run, create an even better experience for you each month.

I am also considering acquiring an advertising agent who will endeavor to bring in more, and significant, advertising. With additional advertising we can afford to try new initiatives that will add to the long-term success of the paper.

Also being considered is expanding the circulation of the paper. Currently our subscriber base is primarily Lincoln with a few members in other states. We want to know what is going on in Masonry in the panhandle of our state, the rural Lodges and Chapters, and those who currently do not have a voice to share their experiences. To make this work we need Masons, Chapters, and Youth Groups holding a conversation on issues that have an effect on Nebraska Masonry; what's going right, what's not working, how can we help each other? We talk a lot about Masonic unity...what if we put it into action with

better communication? Each organization has a history, a story, and a hero who we venerate. Let's not let these pieces of our history slip away into obscurity without sharing them with a greater audience.

What does the Masonic News need from you? Simply put...participation. If you are a subscriber through your Lodge or Chapter you have a representative on the Board of Directors. Are they working for you? Do they come to the Board meetings; better yet does the head officer of your organization know who they are? Do they know who they are? These people make decisions that affect the quality and content of your paper, how well are they representing you? You also have, or should have, a correspondent who writes what your Lodge or Chapter has been, and will be doing in the near future. If you are receiving the Masonic News and it is paid for by your organization, and you do not see an article in it from that organization, you should be asking your Worshipful Master or Worthy Matron why not. If you are not currently a subscriber and want to be, the phone number and email of our business manager and editor are in the paper as well as mine. Contact us and we will get you signed up for \$6 per year...The price of one Starbucks coffee currently! If you sign up online the cost will be \$7 to help defray some of the cost of the website.

Finally, if you are finding members leaving, this is a good way to get your message out. Youth groups over the last four months have submitted two articles letting members know what is going on with their organizations. Two out of a possible twenty submissions so far this year for youth groups in the Lincoln area alone. Brothers and Sisters, we need to start this conversation. I hope you will consider joining us in this movement forward for Masonry...we need every one of you more than ever.

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## Lincoln Lodge #19

Like most Masonic Lodges at this time of year, Lincoln Lodge No. 19 is preparing for it's annual proficiency. We have many new officers that need to learn new parts of the ritual for that event. I found this article online the other day that may help with this process.

#### TIPS FOR MEMORIZING THE RITUALS

Before memorizing any part of the ritual or a Lecture:

1. Learn to read the ritual or lecture fluently without hesitating.
2. Check with one who knows the lecture or ritual to be sure you are not mistaken in your choice of words. If a wrong word is learned, habit makes it difficult to correct the situation, even though the mistake is eventually recognized.
3. Check the dictionary to learn meanings and pronunciations of unfamiliar words.
4. Learn the full meaning of any strange sentences. Check with one who knows the ritual or lecture for explanations of the meaning and symbolism of unfamiliar phrases and sentences. It is difficult to memorize words and sentences that have no meaning to you.
5. Decide how each sentence should sound when read or recited aloud. Decide where voice inflection should occur and where emphasis should be placed. Always read the sentence in the same way, never deviating from what you have once established to be the proper way to do it.
6. Read and re-read the ritual or lecture many times until you are thoroughly familiar with it.
7. Practice, with the cipher closed, writing in proper order all of the subjects discussed in the lecture, and then check with the ritual or lecture to determine what you have omitted or misplaced. In delivering the lecture you will always have to know what comes next.
8. Inspect the slides or lecture charts and acquaint yourself with where they fit into the lecture, however, do not become dependent upon them.

9. Use every opportunity to hear others deliver the lecture or ritual. Make a mental note of what you do and do not like about the way they have given it.

10. Understand that these steps are to be taken before memorizing anything and are as important as the actual job of memorizing, and will require as much of your time as the job of memorizing the lines.

These first hints are very important because the more familiar you are with the lecture, the easier will be the job of memorizing it. Do not be impatient to start memorizing.

To memorize the ritual or a lecture:

1. Learn it paragraph by paragraph; do not attempt to learn too much at any one time.
2. Concentrate on the lecture. Try to be alone, if possible, without distractions from family, television, etc. Keep your mind on the ritual or lecture.
3. Take sections in the proper sequence; do not skip around in learning different sections.
4. Spend as much or more time in reviewing material already learned, as in learning new sections of the ritual. Refuse to learn anything new unless you are fairly confident of your ability to deliver what you have already learned.
5. Practice what you have already learned during odd moments. For example, recite while driving your car, riding a tractor, walking. You will be surprised at the benefit derived from the odd moments which would otherwise be wasted.
6. Always recite your lines in the same manner never changing voice inflections or emphasis once you have decided how they ought to be done. So: prize how, and what, you say.
7. Some prefer to recite aloud when practicing; others prefer the silent method. Most prefer the former, but do what is easier for you. If reciting silently, always concentrate on what you hear in your own mind what the sentences sound like.

8. Strive for perfection. Only by trying are we able to limit our mistakes to a relatively small number.

9. As we are told in the third degree lecture, "Time, patience, and perseverance will accomplish all things."

Some can learn a lecture or ritual with less effort than others, but all can learn it if enough interest and determination is shown.

When discouraged, consider carefully the lecture of the Beehive, as given in the third degree lecture. It will never fail to stimulate your efforts.

When giving the lecture:

1. Always remember that primarily you are talking to the candidates, and the brethren about the lodge are overhearing your remarks. Talk to them in normal voice volume and in a natural tone of voice. Look at the candidates while speaking.
2. Do not let your mind wander to the hard part that comes later on in the lecture. Think only of what you have to say at the moment.
3. Most of your lecture will be given in scene darkness because of projecting slides. Therefore, forget about your blushes and the sweat on your forehead. No one will see it.
4. Graciously accept the prompting, if needed, and go on without worrying or being embarrassed.
5. There should be a single prompter, perhaps the lodge Ritual Instructor. Have this person who knows the lecture sit near your lecture station and tell him not to prompt unless you signal for it.
6. Do not be bashful about insisting to the Master that all Lodge doors be kept closed while you are lecturing and that the Tyler preserve quiet in his quarters. They owe you this courtesy.
7. Do not talk too slowly or too fast; your presentation should be clear and deliberate.
8. Do not try to keep up with the slides; let the slide man keep pace with you.
9. Get expression into the lecture as much as possible without assuming an unnatural tone of voice.

10. When you have given a good lecture, you will know the personal pride, satisfaction and enjoyment that goes with doing the job. That will be your wages for effort.

#### A short introduction to the Masonic Temple at 1635 "L" Street.

The first major undertaking of any Lodge is the securing of a proper meeting place or "home". At first this may not be more than a lodge room together with some limited quarters for social gatherings, a preparation room, paraphernalia storage closet and the like. Eventually more elaborate provisions would be made for more commodious surroundings, such as a reception room, a library, a dining hall and kitchen. Finally, there is the building of a "Masonic Temple."

Today the Temple at 17th and L provides a place of meeting not only for the Lincoln Lodge but for other Masonic Lodges, the Order of Eastern Star, and the York Rite Masons. More and more, as the years roll by, it will be a hallowed place, full of many cherished memories and expressive of the highest hopes of all those who gather there.

All of this represents an investment in terms of dollars, the accumulation of which, in the hands of "The Masonic Temple Association," "The New Masonic Temple Association" and the "Masonic Building Corporation," resulted in the realization of the "dreams and desires" of the Master Masons in the several Lodges, in Lincoln that combined their resources and united their efforts to provide the "New Temple."

The first of these three associations was incorporated in 1882. It issued stock originally amounting to \$26,000 and later increased to \$30,000. The incorporators represented the participating

Lodges. Following the fire in 1899, the second of these associations absorbed the assets of the former and greatly increased them. New stock was issued for the old; the Articles of Incorporation remained substantially the same as they were under the old Association. A new Board of Directors was elected. Capital stock was raised to \$50,000. The value of each share of stock was fixed at \$25 and each of the Lodges was permitted to subscribe for or acquire up to \$10,000 worth of the capital stock.

This new association was empowered to purchase, lease or sell real estate as may be necessary for the transaction of its business. It was also empowered to rent, purchase or construct a Masonic Temple. One of its first acts was the purchase of the Webster Block, just to the north of and adjoining the site of the old Masonic Temple.

Without going into any details respecting the "New Association," it should be noted that Lincoln Lodge No. 19 owned 60 shares of stock in 1917, conservatively valued at \$22,225.

The Masonic Building Corporation came into being in 1920 as the agency to actually build and furnish the New Temple.

The Joint Committee on Financing and Housing consisting of appointed representatives of Lincoln Lodge No. 19 and Lancaster Lodge No. 54 was appointed and made a report, at a regular meeting of Lincoln Lodge No. 19 on May 4, 1920. The members of the Lincoln Lodge were Brothers David C. Hilton, H. H. Wilson, Harry W. Meginnis and W. A. Selleck. Lancaster Lodge No. 54 was represented by Brothers Oscar M. Meyer, Walter L. Anderson and L. J. Dunn. Seldom is one privileged to read a more comprehensive report or one so carefully put together and so beautifully expressed.

## Tales From The North (Dakota)

Greetings from Bismarck/Mandan, North Dakota, from Brother Tyler, a perpetual member of North Star Lodge No. 227 in Lincoln, Nebraska, and dual member of Mandan Lodge No. 8 in Mandan, North Dakota.

I bring you news and experiences from my travels from DeMolay to Masonry to other appendant bodies in Lincoln, Nebraska, to the Twin Cities of Minnesota, and finally to western North Dakota. Hope you enjoy each month as we go on a trip together in search for that which may not have been too lost.

### TWIN PEAKS – Episode 1

Symbolism, esotericism, enlightenment, all within the mystery of life, of our small towns or small communities within our larger cities, of the dimensions of travel of time, space, and the Masonic journey...

As we have enjoyed the initiatic experience, we hopefully have stopped to ponder and reminisce about that experience: What does it all mean? What should it mean as in its intended lessons? What symbolism should I take away from this experience and how do I apply them? What does it mean to travel my own Masonic journey?

Why so cryptic? Those questions and more I've also pondered as I watched the television series, Twin Peaks. The sound track and other innovations of television shows including murder mystery with the mystical are just a touch on the appeal. If you look close enough, you might be able to see some hidden similarities to our Masonic



world, even if the creators, David Lynch and Mark Frost, may not have intended those similarities in their story lines.

What is light without dark, sun without moon, silence without noise, Masonry and related groups without Illuminati and other Occult groups, White Lodge without Dark Lodge? "We are creatures of darkness and light, capable of barbarism and limitless cruelty, and also love, and laughter and the creation of the most sublime beauty. We are both these things, clearly, but which are we more of? I don't know the answer. Is 'evil' a thing – independent, outside of us – or is it an essential part of who we are? I don't know the answer," Dr. Lawrence Jacoby (excerpt from "The Secret History of Twin Peaks: A Novel," by Mark Frost).

It all started with two seasons of "Twin Peaks" TV series, then a movie, "Twin Peaks: Fire Walk with Me", followed 25 years later with a special 18 episode short series "Twin Peaks Returns."
