On August 4, 2018, twelve Brethren from Cotner #297, Craftsmen #314 and Waterloo #102 gathered at the Northeast Family Center in Havelock, NE for a Cotner Lodge #297 event.



There were four Computer Stations, a Dental Station, and Medical Station. Brothers manned the Check-in, Computer and Check-out Stations.



The Dental Station was manned by two students from the College of Dentistry where impressions were made of the kid's teeth.



The Medical station was manned by Rhonda Sanford and her daughter Kristen from Bethel #63, where DNA swabs were taken. All information collected from the children was then given to the parents and erased from the computers. The parents were educated by the Brethren on how to store the DNA and dental impressions, and the photos, interview and description of the kids, stored on a USB thumb drive, were also given to the Parent.



In an event where the child is missing, all this information can be handed to the

authorities saving precious time. Instead of interviewing distraught parents, the authorities can use this information to immediately start search efforts. Since the program began over 45,000 kids in Nebraska have had packets made and given to their parents.



The event lasted for three hours and 40 Identification Packets were processed and given to grateful parents. The event was organized on behalf of the Northeast Family Center by WB Robert Sanford, Member of the Board of the NE Freemasons Child Identification Program Foundation, and WM Mark Rossignol of Cotner Lodge. WB Rob commented that it was great to see so many Brothers willing to come out and support this event. WM Mark provided technical support for the computers when there were technical difficulties. The event went smoothly and the interaction between the Brethren and the Community gave everyone involved a great sense of pride and fellowship.

When I attended the Grand York Rite Convocation of South Dakota last year they had a sale of various Masonic items. I picked up a book that looked very interesting. It was a

"Manual of the Lodge" by Albert Mackey, M.D. written in 1867. It provided some very interesting reading even if it was written in 1867. Much is still very true today in 2018. Below is an article about the apron.

THE LAMBSKIN APRON

"The use of the apron, or some equivalent mode of investiture, as a mystic symbol, was common to all the religious systems of antiquity. Among the Israelites, the girdle formed a part of the investiture of the priesthood In the Persian mysteries of Mithras the candidate was invested with a white apron. In the Brahmincal initiations on Hindostan, the Zennaar, or sacred Lord, was substituted for the apron. The Essenians clothed their novices with a white robe. Even the Japanese, in their ties of initiation, invest their candidate with a white apron.

The color of a Mason's apron should be pure white, because this color in all ages and countries has been deemed an emblem of purity an innocence. Thus, in the early ages of the Christian Church, the newly-baptized convert was invested with white robe, to denote that h had been cleaned from his former sins, and was thenceforth to lead a life of purity, With a similar meaning, the same unified color has been preserved in the apron of the Freemason.

The material of a Mason's apron must be lambskin. No other substance, such as linin, silk, or satin can be substituted, without destroying the symbolic character of the apron, because the lamb in all ages been deemed the appropriate emblem of innocence.

The true Masonic apron should, thus, be unspotted lambskin, from 14 to 16 inches wide, and from 12 to 14 inches deep, with a fall about 3 or 4 inches

deep, square at the bottom, with a sharp angular corners, and without device or ornament of any kind. The usage of the craft in this country has, within a few years past, allowed a narrow edging of blue ribbon, in allusion to that universal friendship which is the bond of the Society, and of which virtue blue is the symbol. But this, undoubtedly, is an innovation, for the ancient apron was without any edging or ornament. All extraneous ornament and devices are in bad taste, and detract from the symbolic character of the investiture. But he silk or satin aprons, bespangled, and painted, and embroidered, which have been gradually creep into our Lodges, have no sort of connection the Ancient Craft Masonry. They are an innovation of French origin, which should be persistently discourage by all who admire the simplicity an beauty of our symbols. A Mason who duly and truly appreciates the symbolic meaning of this apron would no more tolerate linen one for its economy, or embroidered satin one of for decorations, than artist, would a gilded statue."
