The first complexity to this subject is that Masonry provides several different "images" to the public eve depending on who is looking at Masonry. Masonry is a fraternal organization; Masonry is an organization that works toward personal and social improvement; Masonry is an organization that works to aid many charities; and Masonry is an organization that takes its "lessons" from practical science and geometry as well as "allegorical stories and

second part of the combined question, why am I a Mason? First and foremost, Masonry is a fraternal organization, a Brotherhood of members that try to live the concepts of Liberty, Equality, & Fraternity. Masonry works for personal and social improvement within the individual and our society at large. Our emphasis is rights, but when combined, on personal improvement

questions then lead us

ourselves better, can share that improvement with our family, friends, and associates. We do not aim for "converting" others or "recruiting" more members. We aim for leading "by example" and presenting a public image that encourages others to want to ask "how come you are the way you are?" When we hear this question (or any version of it), we have the opportunity to explain how Masonry has helped us get to where and who we are. This will often lead the inquirer to seek further into Masonry and possibly to seek to join Masonry as well. In our Obedience at this time, we encourage individuals to push for the social improvement and changes via their own work as they progress on their personal path of self improvement.

This then is a small overview of what Masonry is and what it does. The depth of the individual's research into any item depends on the desires, capacities and focus of the individual. Masonry provides a framework to start this ongoing conversation as well as a safe environment to discuss and pursue these answers within the Fraternity.

This then brings me to the final item here, "why am I a Mason?". I will close with a very famous Presidential quote that truly embodies this idea, even though there is no record that this president was ever a Mason: "And so, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for you – ask what you can do for your country. My fellow citizens of the world: ask not what America will do for you, but what together we can do for the freedom of man." Inaugural Address by John F. Kennedy -January 20th 1961.

Each Mason will have differing personal answers for this big question of "Why are you a Mason." This is a portion of that answer and a glimpse into the nature of Masonry. Freemasonry gives us a foundation, a superstructure to build upon, and lessons and allegories to prompt us to think. It, therefore, becomes our effort, our work, our ideas that allow us to become builders or "Masons."



places...and they went anyway. The size of the operation, the expectations of the world at large, and the men themselves made the term that, "uncommon valor was a common virtue" ring true time and again.

My wife has an uncle who is buried below that now peaceful ground. He died for the people he was trying to liberate from a madman who was bent on domination of our world while suppressing those freedoms we enjoy today.

It's a little disturbing today that we see some of the days we should be honoring those men and women of "The Greatest Generation" as days to rest, relax and barbeque...often without even putting a flag out in their memory. Time relaxes the memories, makes people forget. Much like the days and months after 9-11-2001 when no matter where you turned there was a great patriotic outpouring. Flags flew in every direction, people stood a little taller, they were a part of something bigger and more profound...they were Americans, and no force of evil could defeat that perception.

The same feeling of our righteous might to help save the world existed seventy five years ago. We, as Americans, knew what had to be done and sacrifices had to be made...the same as today. Around 1,000 veterans of that operation were in Normandy for this event highlighting their service. Many were in their mid-nineties or older...men of distinction who are leaving our ranks at an alarming rate having suffered through so much. Surely God was watching over them in those fateful days, and continues to watch over them. We have men and women in our armed forces today that still subscribe to the principles of freedom and sacrifice allowing no evil to invade our world.

When you see our veterans, thank them for their service...they appreciate it. Always remember that in our lives we have our Constitution to thank for the freedoms we have in our lives...but we have our military to enforce our freedoms when required. God bless you all and keep you safe.

In 1940 the U.S. had no landing craft....by 1944, Higgins Industries had built more than 30,000 wooden LCVP's. The 82nd Airborne Group was code-named "The All Americans" for the D-Day Invasion. General Theodore Roosevelt, a son of President Teddy Roosevelt, spoke the famous words "Let's start the war from here." when he landed on Utah Beach. There were 6,603 casualties on June 6, 1944. May we always honor the legacy and freedoms afforded us by those brave young men.

THE SAINTS JOHN'S



As we rush into the summer season with the vacations, pools/waterparks, amusement parks/carnivals, we come into a new reality of new seasons where it's no longer "April showers bring May flowers," but bring it over to "May snow showers and June storms


bring July blooms." As the seasons change, we as Masons remember our symbols during certain times of the year...Namely the Holy Saints John. Saint John the Evangelist marks the winter solstice on December 27 while Saint John the Baptist marks the summer solstice on June

The Feast of St John's the Baptist is traditionally on celebrate the patron saint of stonemasons and carpenters in the continental represent Cancer and Europe. It is said the earliest recorded Masonic celebration of St John the Baptist day was the institution of the Grand Lodge of England on June 24, 1717, and the installation of new Grand Master of Grand Lodge of Ireland on June 24, 1725.

In the same light, the Grand Session of Job's Daughters, Grand Assembly of Rainbow, and DeMolay State Conclave marks their installation of the new Grand/State Officers during the months of June and July. Some have 6-month terms where they may get installed around the Saints John's day in June/July and/or December/January. Where the time & light is longest at the summer solstice (Saint John the

Baptist) and where time/light is the shortest at the winter solstice (Saint John the Evangelist) lies in time (approx. June 24 and December 27, respectively), they mark the end of an era or term and the beginning of the next.

Moreover, we find the Masonic symbolism of the sun and signs of the Zodiac within the Scottish Rite's 25th Degree. The parallel lines are tangential to the circle of these signs where the intersecting points Capricorn, two gates, the two solstices, and the two Saints John. As we represent the center point, remember the revolution of the seasons in our lives, and let it remind us twice a year to celibate the meaning of the solstice and the Holy Saints John.
