"We as Masons know that the measure of a man lies within him, not in the riches he possesses around him. It is not the number of beautiful things he possesses that makes him happy but the degree to which he is open to

can communicate to others. The size of a man's library is no index to the measure of his learning, but what he understands of what is in his books and the good use he makes of his learning.

"If within our comparatively small worlds of influence and living, we sometimes wonder about how significant brotherhood is after all, we should take a good look at it from a universal point of view. It is the spirit of brotherhood that taught man the meaning of humanity and charity and love and goodness; of mercy and truth and justice. It taught man, under the Fatherhood of God, the process of arriving at what is right—the process that teaches us that through love we learn what is good and through good we learn what is right. It taught man the importance of life and freedom. Man has learned that wherever liberty exists, 'Freedom' is not a political or economic word. It is a

'spiritual' word.

"Is it any wonder that Masonry is so dedicated, so unswervingly devoted to freedom? Is it any wonder that the very heart of Masonic philosophy emphasizes all these qualities that make life abundant and good and free? ... Table Lodge: A festive occasion of fellowship to celebrate our Craft. Thursday, February 21st, Liberty Lodge No. 300 hosted a Table Lodge on a scale we have not seen in years. Forty-five Brothers from several Lodges including Lancaster No. 54, Thistle No. 61, East Lincoln No. 220, Hickman No. 256, Cotner No. 297, Liberty No. 300, College View No. 320 and Bellevue Craft Mason in the No. 325 joined together for an evening of fellowship, reverence and celebration of Brother George Washington's Birthday.

The Ceremony of the Seven Toasts was completed with a few additional toasts. Reflecting on the Toasts there is a reverence to our Fraternity unlike any other. It is not surprising the Trowel is the working tool of the Master Mason, spreading the cement of Brotherly Love and Affection to unite us into one sacred band.

Brother Jake Hedden proposed a toast to our **Brother George** Washington and gave a

time line of several Masonic events throughout his life. Here are just a few:

Nov 4th, 1752 – Washington is initiated as an Entered Apprentice Mason in the Fredericksburg Lodge, Fredericksburg, VA.

March 3rd, 1753 -Washington is passed to the Degree of a Fellow Fredericksburg Lodge, Fredericksburg, VA.

August 4th, 1753 -Washington is raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in the Fredericksburg Lodge, Fredericksburg, VA.

March 23rd, 1782 – Washington receives a letter with an embroidered silk Masonic apron from Elkanah Watson and Francis Corentin Cossoul. The apron was given to Alexandria-Washington Lodge No. 22 in Alexandria, VA in 1812 by Lawrence Lewis, Washington's nephew and remains in the lodge's vault in the George Washington Masonic

April 28th, 1788 -Alexandria Lodge No. 22 received their Virginia charter and George Washington was the first Worshipful Master of the Lodge.

September 18th, 1793 -The cornerstone of the U.S. Capitol is laid by three Masonic Lodges, Potomac Lodge No. 9, Federal Lodge No. 15 and Alexandria Lodge No. 22 with President Washington presiding as the "Acting Master" of the ceremony.

December 14th, 1799 -Washington is called to the Celestial Grand Lodge at age 67. And for 47 years, a brother of the Craft

The Eatery and enjoyed lunch. It was a fun time had by all who attended.




On February 28, our very own Serenity performed in her school's play, Beauty and the Beast. She did a very good job, and it was an amazing performance for everyone there.

"In the Bleak Midwinter..." isn't a song we would


