Our George Washing trivia for this month reminds us of the surrender at Yorktown bringing the Revolutionary War to an end. Documentation in the Library of Congress shares this account: On October 19, 1781 British **General Charles** Cornwallis surrendered his army of some 8,000 men to General George Washington at Yorktown, giving up any chance of winning the Revolutionary War. Cornwallis had marched his army into the

Virginia port town earlier that summer expecting to meet British ships sent from New York. The ships never arrived. In early October, approximately 17,000 American and French troops surrounded the British-occupied Yorktown. Another group of French sailors strategically positioned their naval fleet to control access to Yorktown. The Franco-American siege exhausted the British army's supplies of food and ammunition. With no hope for escape, Cornwallis agreed to General George Washington's terms, signed the surrender documents and marched his defeated troops out of Yorktown to the tune of "The World Turned Upside Down".




