Brethren, it is with great sadness that we must announce the passing of Worshipful Brother Steven A. Green. W.B. Green was initiated into Lancaster Lodge #54 on May 17, 1968, passed on June 28, 1968 and raised to the sublime degree on September 27, 1968. W.B. Green served as Worshipful Master of Lancaster Lodge #54 in 1978.

W.B. Green served as a **Deputy Grand Custodian** for 30 years, beginning in 1988, and was made an **Emeritus Deputy Grand** Custodian in 2019. He served as the Grand Representative to Alberta from 1995 to present, and also served on the Committee on Work multiple times.

W.B. Green acted as a mentor to many Masons throughout the state, and was directly responsible for an untold number of men obtaining individual proficiency, as well as numerous lodges obtaining lodge proficiency, improving the standard of their degree work, and teaching the meaning behind the work.

Brother Jimmy Ray was raised to the sublime degree of of a Master Mason on November 18. We all welcome and congratulate him on his success.

During the December business meeting, Brother Michael Williams was successful in proving up as an Entered Apprentice Mason and is now waiting for his Fellowcraft ceremony.




lock on the door is being removed. To gain assess to the building you will need a key, or have someone let you in. If you do not have a key and want one, contact the secretary of your organization.

As we explore our trivia of George Washington, we look at what Christmas was like at Mount Vernon. Christmas was primarily a religious holiday in 18th century Virginia; but it was also a festive occasion marked by visits between friends and relatives, celebratory parties, and public assemblies. As described by George Washington's correspondence, diaries, and cash accounts, Christmas at Mount Vernon followed a typical pattern for the region and time period. The Washingtons preferred to spend the holiday with family and friends, and George and Martha frequently had quests over to celebrate the holiday. Mount Vernon guests were encouraged to make themselves at home and take part in typical seasonal activities such as hunting and foxhunting. There are several historical references to these expeditions between Christmas and Twelfth Night or January 6th. There are, unfortunately, no surviving descriptions

of a Christmas dinner at

Mount Vernon but one of Martha Washington's cookbooks included a recipe for Christmas pie. This was a savory pastry including turkey, pigeon, and chicken baked and spiced with salt, black pepper, nutmeg, and cloves.

Let us reflect as we close out one year and begin a new one: In the words of Vern McLellan

"What the new year brings to you will depend a great deal on what you bring to the new year."

WB Joel Green had the pleasure of visiting lodges in Missouri and Iowa recently. First, in the village of Arrow Rock, Missouri, where the 1973 film Tom Sawyer was filmed, is Brown Lodge No. 22 A.F. & A.M. Chartered in 1881, it is the only remaining African American lodge building of three in Arrow Rock. Brown Lodge houses a permanent exhibit: Reflections of African Americans 1865-

opportunity, check out Arrow Rock, Missouri, as the entire village is a National Landmark.

Second, Modale Masonic Hall built in Modale, Iowa, was built in 1880 and used to be a school until 1911. The Masons converted the gymnasium into their lodge room and in the 1920s and

30s, their stage was used as a theater. which provided the lodge income. Dissolved in 2004, this lodge merged with Missouri Valley's in 2004. The unique building was placed on the National Register in 2014 check it out sometime if you're ever in the area.

Christmas is Fragrance...the pine and


