

May was busy for Bethel #5 as we did some community service projects and celebrated our 100th birthday. On March 14th, members from the Bethel gathered at our spot for our usual highway cleanup. We had great weather and did our part to beautify one section of Nebraska's highways. We enjoy our stretch of highway because we have some houses along the route and many times, they come out and say thank you to us, which makes it worthwhile.



In 2021 Bethel #5 turned 100 years old, but due to COVID, we were unable to celebrate so we postponed it to this year. We are fortunate to have Mrs. Ethel T Wead Mick sign our charter since she was the founder of Job's Daughters. The original



charter for Bethel #5 included 123 names and is still displayed at every Bethel meeting. Bethel #5 was instituted on May 27th 1921 and chartered on June 24, 2022. The Bethel met at 236 So. 11th Street in Lincoln until September 9, 1935 when their new home at 1635 L Street was built.



In 1932, Bethel #5 had the honor of having the very first Grand Bethel Honored Queen, Ms. Margaret Lapp. The Bethel also helped to institute Bethel #27 in May of 1939. Bethel #5 has been committed to serving the community, even back in 1941 when members of Bethel #5 that were attending Lincoln High School spent over

161 hours wrapping bandages for the Red Cross. According to minute activities available for book notes from April 8 1947, Mrs. Bennett, a Past Bethel Guardian, said that Bethel #5 was the second largest Bethel in the US with a membership of 400. By May 1955, 93 members were in regular attendance at the meetings. Between 1972-1973, Bethel #5 was home to not only the **Grand Bethel Honored** Queen Ms. Linda Greenwald but also the Supreme Bethel Honored Queen Ms. Penny Barrett. In 1974, the Royal Purple Degree was awarded for the first time and 2 Council Members from Bethel #5 were among those receiving the award. Those two were Linda Greenwald and Paula Beezley. All in all, Bethel #5 has has the following honors:
