

"The Rite of Circumambulation, derived from the Latin verb 'curcumambulare,' sacred object.

Thus, in Greece, the priest and the people, when engaged in their sacrificial rites, always walked three times around the altar while sing a sacred hymn. Macrobius tells us that this ceremony had reference to the motion of the heavenly bodies, which, according to the ancient poets and philosophers, produced a harmonious sound, inaudible to mortal ears, which was called 'the music of the spheres."

"Much stress was laid by the ancients of the necessity of keeping the altar on the right hand of the persons moving around because it was in this way only that apparent motion of the sun from east to west could be initiated."
