Members of Electa were recognized for their continual support of masons who work Saturday morning for the upkeep and maintenance of the Temple. These ladies are at the Temple every working Saturday providing a nourishing meal to the workers.

One of the "things" we did not discuss, and is typically not discussed, is suicide. There are 22 veterans a day who complete suicide. This number, as well as all suicides are unacceptable. Suicide rates are high in children. 1 in 4 school age children have thought about suicide. I am not an authority on suicide or suicide prevention so a lot of this information I have copied directly from suggested sites about prevention. This is an important topic so I have included the sites where you can go and read more at your leisure. We all need to be more aware as you never know when you could save a life.

988 is the number for the National Suicide Prevention Hotline, and option #1 is the suicide prevention hotline number specific for veterans. You can call, text, or chat988, or visit suicidepreventionlifeline.org

The suicide prevention hotline has over 200 crisis centers staffed by trained volunteers. They had

2,565,402 calls in 2021. For every one person who completes suicide annually 316 persons seriously consider suicide, but do not complete the act.

According to the Department of Veterans Affairs' National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report (2019), the suicide rate among Veterans is 1.5 times greater than the non-Veteran population ages 18+, with over 6,000 Veterans dying by suicide each year. Despite accounting for just 7.9% of the population, Veterans account for 13.5% of all suicide deaths in the United States.

Masonic Youth Leadership Conference



Nebraska Masonic Youth, prospective members, adult advisors and leaders of their sponsoring bodies gathered together for the "The Power is Yours" 7th Triennial Nebraska Masonic Youth Leadership Conference in Kearney on October 8 and 9. The conference originally scheduled for 2020 had been postponed twice due to the impacts of Covid making it five years since the youth of DeMolay, Job's and Rainbow had been able to meet for a conference.



Saturday morning began with the youth leaders from each of the Nebraska Masonic Youth groups sharing their energy and excitement for the arrival of the weekend. MW Alex Straatmann Grand Master brought greetings and welcomed the attenders to Kearney. Keynote address of David Flood from Long Island, New York encouraged and engaged youth with a "call to action"....to reach, to respect, and to do. Flood stressed that we must look on the inside not our appearances, daily offer respect and gratitude, and to look around to never let anyone eat alone.



Saturday afternoon attenders were divided into three small

groups and each attended a rotation of the three break out Worthy Patron Wayne sessions. These rotations included hands on service in Kearney in our fight against hunger with attenders purchasing groceries and personal care items at Kearney's HyVee and then delivering to the Community Action Partnership food bank and preparing the items for distribution. Also included in the break out sessions was presenter Karen Bramman of Council Bluffs whose message of awareness of your surroundings and your relationships encouraged attenders to be better prepared to defend themselves from hurtful situations. Third rotation was presented by the Masonic Youth Leaders and addressed use of social media in promoting our



Following the evening meal, our Masonic Family Portrait presentation included some history and current information about each organization in our Nebraska Masonic Family. Organizational leaders dressed in their regalia represented each organization and then posed for the family portrait. Matt Markey, Omaha, provided lively hypnotic entertainment. Participants from the audience demonstrated the power of hypnosis and provided great entertainment for all. The evening ended with a dance with music and entertainment engaging all attenders.

Partnered with the 2022 Masonic Youth leadership Conference was the "WAR ON HUNGER" project to fight hunger in Nebraska. The MYLC on October 8-9 in Kearney provided an opportunity for our attenders and supporters to collect food donations, collect monetary donations, and reach out in hands on service. Individuals and groups could support food banks and organizations in their local areas and before the conference. Individuals and groups could bring donations of food, personal care items and monetary donations to the conference which would then be donated to the central Nebraska food bank in Kearney (Community Action Partnership of Mid-Nebraska). Individuals and groups attending the conference also shopped at Hyvee and delivered food

the food bank warehouse. Hands on service at the warehouse allowed the conference participants to become familiar with the process and facilitation of food distribution, stocking, and warehousing. The conference also made a financial donation to **Community Action** Partnership of Mid-Nebraska for their food bank needs and acquisitions.



To sum up our impact: 6 Job's Daughter's Bethels, 6 Nebraska Rainbow Assemblies, and 3 DeMolay chapters and their members, supporters and sponsoring bodies participated in the challenge and project. The Masonic Youth Foundation, Grand Chapter of OES, Grand Bethel and Rainbow Grand Assembly and additional chapters and lodges also supported the project.



When all donations are totaled we believe that more than 10,000 meals will be facilitated for distribution, as well as personal care items. Almost 3 ton of food was donated across our state with 2500 pounds remaining in

Kearney for distribution throughout central Nebraska.



In competition we recognize Bethel #5 Lincoln with the largest donation. Plainview Assembly #34 IORG and Lincoln Chapter DeMolay made the largest contributions for our other youth groups. Thank you to all who participated. Together we make a difference and impact the needs of Nebraskans.





On a recent visit to Hannibal, Missouri, I had the pleasure of meeting St. John's Lodge #87's Worshipful Master Jeff Williams. St John's #87 is a fairly active lodge that was chartered in 1839. During this visit, I learned that Mark abroad. Twain (Samuel Clemens) was a Mason! As a middleschool English teacher and author, I found this especially interesting. Samuel Clemens was initiated as an EA at Polar Star Lodge #79 in St. Louis in 1861 while he worked as a riverboat pilot. Later in life, as he traveled the world giving lectures from everywhere from Canada to India, he often made Masonic friendships in whatever country he visited. I enjoyed visiting with WM Williams in Hannibal and made a donation to their lodge. Once I knew Clemens was a Mason, I wanted to see if he made any allusions to the craft

during his illustrious career. There aren't many, but here are two:

In his 1869 novel Innocents Abroad, Twain writes in chapter 23 "...and in a spirit of thankfulness which is entirely unaccountable, considering the slim foundation there was for it, he praised his Maker that he was as he was, and went on enjoying his little life just the same as if he really had been deliberately designed and erected by the great Architect of the Universe."

And there's another he apparently made in New York in November 1900. While having dinner at the Lotus Club in November 1900 Twain made a speech in which he stated, "...the grip and word that lift a man up and make him glad to be alive." How uplifting is that? Like Twain, I encourage you to make Masonic friendships during your travels within the US and


