January 20 we will be According to some, the first native born American Mason is Jonathan Belcher. He September 23, 1857 was first made a Mason in England in 1704.

> The first Provincial **Grand Master in** America was Daniel Coxe. He was appointed by the Duke of Norfolk, Grand Master of the Mother Grand Lodge in June 1730. There is little evidence which shows Coxe ever exercised his deputation.

In April 1733 a deputation was issued to Henry Price as Provincial Grand Master on New England.

So who is the real father of Freemasonry in America? It's a coin toss and depends on whom you speak with

and where they are from.

In 1854 Illinois granted Nebraska Lodge a dispensation to go to work. Their Charter was received in 1855. On May 10, 1855 Missouri granted Giddings Lodge a dispensation Allen Roberts and and it was chartered on May 26, 1856. On June 3, 1857 Capital Lodge in Omaha was chartered.

These three Nebraska lodges formed the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons on with Robert Carrel Jordan being elected as the first Grand Master in Nebraska.

1874 - I'll get around to this date later. It is more important to us than the above trivia.

1759. They were married at her home in New Kent County. She was a young 26year-old widow but the owner of more than 17,500 acres of land. Even though grief-stricken at the loss of her husband, she considered relatively short time, not out of necessity but for love and companionship.

When Martha and George met, the attraction was mutual, powerful, and immediate. Martha found someone that she could trust as well as love...she never wrote a legally

binding premarital contract, which was common in the day, to protect her vast assets but willingly wanted George to manage and protect their financial interests as well as become the legal quardian of her two children. The marriage lasted for 40 years, until Washington's death in 1799. Martha died three years later.


